High-rise London

[This news article considers tall buildings in London, the capital of the UK]

- A. The London cityscape is undergoing a major transformation with many tall buildings appearing and many more on the way. The backers say it all symbolises London's confidence as a global financial centre. But not everyone agrees.
- B. London's skyline is **upwardly mobile**. Work is about to begin near the Thames on a building called the Shard, a spire of steel and glass that will literally **skewer** the skyline rising 310 meters. By some measures the sky piercing spike will be the tallest building in Europe, a mark of London's growing confidence according to the developer Barry Ossle:
- **c**. OSSLE: To make London compete at the highest level, one needs modern architecture, new buildings, iconic buildings.
- **D.** For him big can be beautiful. The dome of St Paul's Cathedral still stands out above its neighbours it's a protected view but in the heart of the financial district, what Londoners call the City, there's a reach for the sky that will see 9 or 10 new **high rise buildings shoot-up** in the coming years, with a similar number again to supplement the existing towers of the business development known as Docklands.
- E. But tall buildings **don't suit all tastes**. UNESCO recently warned that the 1,000 year old Tower of London the Thames-side home to **the crown jewels** and a key London landmark was at risk of losing its **World Heritage Status** as new buildings **muscled in**. Love them or loath them, **there is confidence in buckets** here and the new buildings symbolise it. London will never look like Manhattan and on a global scale its buildings may be **puny** but it is striding into a new era, whilst trying not to forget its past.
